Dearly Beloved,

On January 6, the thirteenth day of Christmas, the Church celebrates the Epiphany of Our Lord. It's the day we remember the visit of the magi to the infant Jesus (Matt. 2:1-12). While we will not have a service that day, we still do well to remember the day, at least in our personal or family devotions.

Why would we want to remember that day? Well, it's the day we remember the revelation, the epiphany, of our Lord to the gentiles. Those magi had seen the star that appeared when Jesus was born. By God's grace, they determined that it signified the birth of the King of the Jews. Perhaps they had heard the prophecies from the Israelite exiles in Babylon years before. So when they saw the star, they wanted to pay homage to that King.

Of course, it took a while to travel from the east to Judea, possibly a year or more.

And while they sought Him, they didn't know where they might find Him. So they went to Jerusalem, the capital city of Judea. And when they arrived and inquired where the King might be found, Herod was distressed. He would not allow a possible rival to live. Yet, he didn't know where to look either.

So he called the chief priests and the scribes to ask where the Christ was to be born. The only way they might know was it was prophesied by Micah. They had to consult the Scriptures, the Word of God. It was only by God's revelation that they would be directed to the Christ-Child.

The magi, non-Israelites, believed that Word, and went to Bethlehem. They were guided by the star according to God's will. And when they found the Child, they rejoiced. They had sought the King of the Jews, the Christ, and found Him by following God's Word. "And going into the house they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they fell down and worshiped him. Then, opening their treasures, they offered him gifts, gold and frankincense and myrrh." (Matt. 2:11).

Of course, gold is a gift for a King. The frankincense reminds us that Jesus is divine. When the Israelites offered their sacrifices, they were often accompanied by incense. Furthermore, the Psalmist writes, "Let my prayer be counted as incense before you, and the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice!" (Ps. 141:2). That verse is used in Vespers, the evening prayer service. And myrrh was an aromatic resin used in preparing a body for burial. So, it reminds us that the Child the see and worship would die, thus pointing us ahead to Good Friday.

Then, being warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they went home another way.

It is most certainly good to seek Jesus, but only where He has promised to be found—in His Word and Sacraments. That's why it's so important to have personal/family devotions each day and to attend and participate in the Divine Service each week. For that is where He is revealed to us as God and Man, our Prophet, Priest, and King, our Good Shepherd, our Savior, our Lord. No, we will not find Him as the magi did, but we will most certainly see Him by faith as He is revealed to us. That's what His epiphany is all about.

Since the house in which Jesus was found by the magi was blessed by the presence of Jesus, so the Church observes the custom of blessing homes during the Epiphany season. It's a tangible way to think of our homes as being blessed by Jesus. Such a house blessing is a short time of hearing God's Word and praying in your home so that, as God is continually present in your life, you would recognize that He comes to you in blessing in your home and in all you do. If you would like such a house blessing, please let me know and I will be happy to serve you.

Jesus has indeed promised, "Behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." He is indeed with you, bringing you life, forgiveness, and salvation!"

God grant you very blessed and joyous Epiphany season.


